The itinerary is.....

Day #1

Thursday 14th April we stay overnight (meet up) at the Brookton Caravan Park, where we will camp overnight.



Day #2

Friday 15th April, travel from Brookton to Kokerbin Rock, approx. 140 klms.



Known as Kokerbin Hill, it is the third largest monolith in Australia and its recognised as an interesting unspoilt spot for flora and fauna study.

It covers 9 hectares and is 122m high with interesting formations, caves and a deep well on the western side.

Situated approximately 40km north-west of Bruce Rock, the picnic and barbecue facilities that are available, make it an ideal location for a pleasant outing with family and friends.

Parks and Wildlife Service plus the Shire of Bruce Rock are working to improve signage and walk trails throughout the reserve.

The walk trail can be accessed via the picnic area or the Well site and it will take you past the devils marbles and to the top of the granite outcrop for sweeping views of the area.



Free Camping over night at Kwolyin

Kwolyin Campsite is situated on what used to be the old football oval. You wouldn't know it. Pristine bush, with orchids, flowering annual and

sandalwoods surround the camp. Rarely can you sit in a picnic shelter and look on at orchids on the sides of the shelter. Or, park your caravan in a dedicated bay in the bush.

The camp boasts toilets, camp kitchen, large & small shelters, dedicated tent camping and caravan bays, campfires with BBQ plate (April till Sept only), bush walks and a pioneer walk trail through the old campsite & more.

*There are no camping fees, and bookings are not required.



Day #3

Saturday 16th April, travel to Hyden, aprox 170 Klms, taking one of the 3 available routes.



Decision has not yet been finalised on where we will actually camp in Hyden. There are several of options we are looking at and rest assured it will be a good spot to suit our group.

Wave Rock



The Hyden Salt Pools lie just 800mtrs behind the more famous Wave Rock. The Salt pools are Gypsum based and you will not require any pool noodle to float here.

Free Camp Overnight






















Elachbutting Rock is a massive granite outcrop, a very popular camping spot for 4x4 wheel clubs and for locals, also a popular site for weddings and other gatherings.

Elachbutting Rock is a spectacular natural rock formation with similar features to Wave Rock. The rock has a number of large cavern areas and is surrounded by natural bushland.

Day #5

Monday 18th April travel west to Beacon & then onto Kalannie, aprox 180 klms



We have not yet finalised our camp spot as we have several options available and can afford to discuss this the night before and then lock it in.

Some of these wheatbelt towns have great free camp spots right in town

Day #6

Tuesday 19th April we start to wind our way home towards Perth aprox 280klms, Via Toodyay and Northam.

The below article was sent in by a member in early February after our Australia Day get together and also seeing the story in our January issue on Rod Spargo's DS, EFI Automatic. The EFI Automatic brought back memories and reminiscences.............

Unfortunately, the email got lost in the ether somewhere so hence the delay in it only just getting to print now.



Dear Sir,

Some thoughts on matters secular:

I recently spent a few fruitful hours over the afternoon and morning of the 25th and 26th of January at Gallagher way. In the company of two delightful hosts Scott and Jack, plus their dog Jeffery.

1/ Classic Cars & Coffee Sunday April 3rd




This is a monthly event and well worth going along to. Its great way to start a Sunday morning.
