Since we have just had Anzac Day a southern ACE member and regular contributor to our magazine has reminded me about this story and its well worth recounting.

I happened to stumble upon a fascinating bit of wartime Citroën lore. It involves screwing with Nazis in a genuinely clever and subtle way that nevertheless had big repercussions. I'll explain.

So, when France was occupied by the Germans in 1940, major French factories like Citroën were forced to produce equipment for the Nazis. Citroën president Pierre-Jules Boulanger knew he couldn't just refuse to produce anything, but he also knew there's no way in hell he's going to just roll over and build trucks for a bunch of filthy Nazis. Pierre had a *plan*.

John Reynold's book Citroën 2CV describes Boulanger's sabotage efforts. Of course, he instructed workers to set a nice, leisurely pace when building trucks (likely Citroën T45 trucks) for the Wermacht, but that's fairly obvious. What was brilliant was Boulanger's idea to move the little notch on the trucks' oil dipsticks that indicated the proper level of oil down just a bit lower.

By moving the notch down, the trucks would not have enough oil, but German mechanics would have no idea, because, hey, the little notch on the dipstick says its just fine. Then, after the truck has been used for a while and is out deployed somewhere crucial, whammo, the engine seizes up, and you've got a lot of angry, stranded, vulnerable Nazis, balling up their little fists and redly barking curses in German.

It's such a fantastic act of sabotage: it's extremely cheap to implement, it's subtle, there's no way to see something amiss is happening as the trucks are being built, and it delivers its blow away from the site of the sabotage and when it will cause the most inconvenience and trouble.

Citroen produced for the Germans between 1941 and 1944: 3,700 Type 23 trucks, 6,000 Type 32U trucks and 15,300 Type 45 truck's.







MEMBER FOCUS



People may recall we did an article on the "Red Dust Revival" at Lake Perkolilli, back in September 2022 I think.

Basicly Lake Perkolilli was a claypan race track, just outside of Kalgoorlie and locals used to race their cars their back back in the early 1900's.

"Red Dirt Revival" is now a race meeting that occurs ever 3 or 4 years and the cars that race are cars from that golden eara that raced at lake Perkolilli back in the day.

So vehicles with a heritage that where built between 1914 and 1939 are at the core of this race meeting.

For those that may not be aware one of our members, John Freeman built a replica of the "Petite Rosalie" and took it to compete at Lake Perkolilli in the 2022 Red Dirt Revival.

Just to give you some background on where this name Rosalie came from and its heritage.

Back in 1933 before WW2 Citroen launched the 8CV ,10CV and 15CV at the Paris motor show. The Engineering highlite on these 3 x models was that Citroen had created rubberised engine mountings that saw the engine sit free from the chassis eliminating a lot of destructive engine vibration.

It was another of those Citroen engineering inovations and to prove its durrability they entered into a partnership with Yacco a specialty lubricants supplier (Similar to say todays Fuchs lubricants)

So to gain full adverising exposure Citroen had a series of cars they they built between 1933 - 1938 called Rosalie. They put these models through punishing time trial and endurance runs at the Montlhéry race circuit.

To go even a step further Citroen engineers came up with a striped down version of Rosalie.

Smaller lighter engine 1.4 ltr 32hp, redesigned body work which was lighter and more areodynamic for its time, plus it had a much lighter chassis.

This car became known as the "Petite Rosalie" it was based on an 8CV chassis.

It lapped the Montlhéry circuit non-stop from March 15 to July 27, 1933, for a full 134 days under the supervision of the French Automobile Club. During that time, it covered more than 300,000 kilometres, at an average speed of 93 kph (57.8 mph).

Citroen continued to produce so many great models with many innovations, that the Rosalie story faded......

Not with John Freeman

John had gone along to the 2019 running I think of the Red Dirt revival and must have loved it.

John had the bones of a 1934 build Citroen C4G car, he got to work with a mechanical rebuild in line with keeping it as historically correct as possible to the Petite Rosalie.

John laboured for over a year to build the complete body excluding the fire wall and engine cowl and radiator surround.

"The car is as accurate as I could build from the equipment available in my shed and I think it is a close resemblance to the record breaking "Petite Rosalie".






Fantastic effort John and great craftmanship with this marvellous recreation of 'Petite Rosalie' - the famous Citroen record breaker from the 1930s.



Weltii Virtanen lived in Finland but kept a 2CV here in Australia.

It has been stored for many years at Greg Bracegirdle's house. Weltii and his 2 sons have been over to Australia, and all used the car on occasions. Weltii was an excellent mechanic, and the car did the 2008 raid from Kalgoorlie to Kununurra.

A group of us went earlier this year to move the car from Greg's house. we took a battery with us as the car hadn't been started for a few years. once we got past the immobilizer, the engine started first time even on the old stale fuel and it runs beautifully.

Sadly, Weltii died in 2017 and although the family have kept the car registered and insured all this time, they have decided to sell the vehicle. I offered to take it to my place to put it undercover.

The car contains lots of tools and lots of spare parts. Some are really special tools for the 2CV and well thought out for a raid. When I drove it to Northam via Toodyay, some 130 km I was astounded at just how beautifully the car drives. I love my 2CV, but this one is even smoother.

There's some rust on the bottom of the rear doors, The seats in my opinion need the covers replacing. the roof look like it's a new one. I have emptied the car and sorted all the contents out. There's lots of tools and camping gear all good for a raid. I have cleaned all the tools and contents.

The vehicle is fully licensed on WA plates until July 2023.

If anyone is thinking of doing the raid next year this would be a great vehicle, but it will need to have the rego paid before it runs out. The cost of importing a vehicle since Covid has risen dramatically.

As such all our French vehicles are worth more because of the cost of getting one imported. The price being asked is \$15,000 which includes everything. If anyone is interested, please contact me, and I can give you more photos of the contents and answer any questions.






2CV WORLD MEET HISTORY



History

The first World Meeting of 2CV's friends took place in 1975 in Finland. They were then held every two years, each time in a different country after the election of the host country.

At the first 10 Meetings the decision about the venue of the next Meeting was made on the basis of the votes of the participants. Each car was entitled to one vote.

From the 11th Meeting on, the election was held 4 years earlier. Each country represented was given 2 votes, independently of the number of participating vehicles.
















Next year Cit-In will be in Tasmania and there has been a rush of bookings already, I think its going to prove a very popular Cit-In destination.





RAID AUSTRALIA 2024 DATES

Raid 2024 starts on 1 August and finishes on 28 August.

The proposed route is a west/east crossing of the continent, with some similarities to the first raid, Raid 88.

The proposed starting point is Baldivis in Western Australia, then going to Wave Rock, Kalgoorlie, Laverton and across the Ann Beadell Highway to Coober Pedy.

Then we will travel to William Creek, Marree and up the Birdsville Track to Birdsville.

After that we go to Longreach, and then Gayndah
